

# <u>Vietnam War 1955-1975 : Acknowledging the</u> <u>19s/Reserves players (Associate EFCPP&OA members)</u> <u>who served in Vietnam</u>

lain 'Fingers' FINDLAY

Vietnam Veteran AFL Tribunal Advocate U19s player - 1966: 1967 #16

Known to many simply as 'Fingers' or 'E', Iain Findlay played for Essendon U19's in 1966 and 1967. Coached by legendary Alan 'Basher' Thaw, Iain played on the half-forward flank.

Twice weekly, after school, he would hitchhike to join teammates training at *Windy Hill* and hitchhike back home to Forest Hill in Melbourne's east. Those were the days of recruitment zones in the VFL. Essendon's patch was Nunawading/Ringwood/Mitcham and some legendary footy names emerged to Don the Sash: Paul Salmon, Gary O'Donnell, and Darren 'Daisy' Williams to name a few.

After leaving school lain entered the Victorian Police Academy, passing out in October 1968. For the young men of that era, it was the time of conscription and National Service. Iain found himself graduating one day and drafted into the army the next. Training camps in Puckapunyal, Indooroopilly (Qld.) followed before being deployed to Vietnam in 1970. His tour of duty would last for 13 months.

As a Corporal trained in policing, Findlay was attached to the Royal Australian Army Ordnance Corps, serving in the Australian Force Vietnam Provost Unit. Working from Vung Tau, Nui Dat, and Saigon (Ho Chi Minh City) in addition to military policing, the unit's personnel utilised their skills to support members of the Australian Embassy Defence Liaison with security matters.

During his tour of Vietnam, Iain was severely injured, when the vehicle he was travelling in ran over a land mine. Six months of surgeries and rehabilitation followed.

Returning home in 1971 to return to his chosen career in the police force, lain worked undercover as a member of the Drugs Squad. Again lain was on the receiving end of the unfriendly fire, this time in Heidelberg. He spent over two decades on cases involving some of Melbourne's worst criminals.

Many will know of lain's role as an advocate representing players before the AFL Tribunal. Recalling his first case in 1978 where he represented EFC Reserves player Michael Doyle, lain proudly notes that: "I got him off". "I've represented every single club in the AFL at the Tribunal and also worked with Tassie and Victorian country leagues." Iain's final case as an advocate was in 2022, when he analysed the Channel 7 tapes on behalf of Carlton FC/Patrick Cripps and their legal team.

lain turned his hand to team management during State of Origin campaigns in the 1980s:

"I was Team Manager for the Victorian side, and later Team Manager for the NSW side. Working with the likes of Teddy Whitten, Bobby Skilton, and Billy Goggin was memorable."

As a Director of Rule Prostate Cancer and the E J Whitten Foundation lain, has for many years played an active role in fundraising via the E J Whitten Legends Game. Awareness programs for men's health, leading-edge research, and treatment clinics have been beneficiaries

lain has family connections linked to Essendon. His father-in-law, Allan *'Bunny'* Woods is the EFC oldest living player, having played with the reserves pre-WWII. Iain met his wife Samantha when both were members of the EFC Cheer Squad. Today they are active members of the Essendonians coterie.

#### John 'Jock' HASLETT Vietnam Veteran Reserves grade player 1964, 1965 #40

Jock was coached by Bill Hutchison in '64 and Greg Sewell in '65.

Playing as a full back, Jock recalls Collingwood's very young Len Thompson as a tall streak and formidable opponent.

Following his 30 games with the Bombers, Jock played a season with Redan in the Ballarat League.



Conscripted into National Service in 1967 – the same army intake as EFC's Ian Payne - Jock was posted to Vietnam in 1968. Stationed at Nui Dat, Private Haslett served as a Rifleman in the Royal Australian Infantry Corps (4<sup>th</sup> Battalion, Royal Australian

Regiment). At the end of his tour of duty, Jock was thankful to return home to family and friends "in one piece".

Six degrees of separation: As a member of the Kyneton High School football team, Jock recalls a match played against Essendon High on their home ground. Following the game, Jock was billeted to have dinner with Essendon's Whitbourne family. As young men, Peter Whitbourne and Jock's paths would cross again, playing for Essendon and both would be called up for National Service, which included tours of duty in Vietnam.

#### Peter Graeme WHITBOURNE

Vietnam Veteran

U19s and Reserves player: 1964: 1966

#43

Peter attended Essendon High. The Whitbourne family lived in Birdwood Street North Essendon. Connections with EFC are many. Club Secretary Bill Cookson was a neighbour; a young Alec Epis boarded with Mrs. Hickey down the road, in all 7 players lived in the street. Peter played schoolboy footy against Kyneton High, hosting his future EFC teammate and fellow Vietnam Veteran, John 'Jock' Haslett at the family home, after the game. Coached by Alan 'Basher' Thaw and Greg Sewell, Peter proudly notes a memorable reserves game kicking 4 goals against Melbourne on the 'G'. He adds wryly, he is still owed \$3 in unpaid wages for games played! Peter, we'll be sure to let the EFC CEO know there'll be a claim heading the club's way!

In 1966 Peter was conscripted. Attached to the Royal Australian Infantry Corps, Private Whitbourne was sent to Vietnam in 1968. Stationed at Nui Dat, he was a member of the 1st Battalion, the Royal Australian Regiment's mortar platoon. Peter fought in the Battle of Coral-Balmoral in May 1968.\*\*

\*\*Awarded 13 May 2018 (50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the battle), The Battle of Coral/Balmoral citation states ... in recognition of extraordinary individual and collective gallantry ... displayed on numerous actions... the **Unit Citation for Gallantry** was awarded to units and men."



The **Unit Citation for Gallantry** is a collective group decoration awarded to members of Australian military units. It recognises extraordinary gallantry in action. The actual citation is a warrant presented to the unit. Insignia are worn by individuals to denote their membership of a unit that has been awarded a citation. As of June

2018, only six awards have been made.

## **Where Are They Now?**

## Michael Hartley

Years played: Essendon 2016-2019 / Hawthorn 2020-2021

**Games:** 49 (44- Essendon / 5 – Hawthorn) **Goals:** 2 (1- Essendon / 1 – Hawthorn)

Number/s worn: 36 -Essendon / 27 - Hawthorn



What did you do, football wise, following your playing days at Essendon? I spent two years on Hawthorn FC's list. The year after that, I played/coached in the VFL with Collingwood and was aligned with Seymour in the Goulburn Valley League. I also was a AFLW Development Coach at Collingwood FC. In 2023, I'm playing full time at Seymour.

## What job/jobs did you pursue following your playing days, including what are you doing currently?

I worked at Ladder (main charity of the AFL Players' Association) as a mentor and support worker. I then moved into disability support work where I worked giving one-on-one assistance. Now I run an under 18's competition in Bendigo called the CVFL U18's (Central Victorian Football League). I'm also a Dad to two (soon to be three) flat out kids.

Have you suffered with any port football injuries and have required surgery? I broke my nose badly in 2016. I really go see about it now as I can't really smell very well. It's ruined my modelling career post-football also.

## What are your thoughts on the modern game, and how would you change any of the areas you don't like?

Obviously trying to keep the game going fast and being as exciting as possible is always nice. I'd like to see someone bring the torp back into style! Other than that, I really enjoy how footy is being played at the moment.

## Who were your mates in your playing days with Essendon, do you keep in touch?

Feels like I played so long ago, Walla and I spent a lot of time together and we catch up when he is not swamped by his adoring fans. Jordan Ridley and Mason Redman are absolutely dominating at the moment - they were young when I was at Essendon, but I really enjoyed playing some VFL games with them, and now to watch them shining at AFL level is great. Taught them everything they know!

## Do you have any special anecdotes from your playing time to pass onto other past players?

Michael Hartley- "let the kickers, kick". Nobody listened to that one when I played. No one wanted to give the key backman the ball - I save it for local footy now.

Who were the players you most admired in your playing days at Essendon? For Essendon: Mark Baguley. He was a warrior every time he went out to play. Didn't receive as much praise as he deserved. He was tough.

**Other teams:** Josh Kennedy from West Coast. I remember one preseason game we played the Eagles over in the West. It was 40 degrees in the middle of the day. I played on him, and all he did was run, and run. He worked so hard. I lost 10kg that day and was knackered after the game. I just loved how he went about his footy.

## Do you have any comments that you would like to pass on from your time at Essendon?

I loved my time at the Essendon Football Club. The players, coaches, support staff and the fans made it memorable for me. To be a tiny part of such an historic organisation will always mean something to me. I'd love to be involved back at the club in some capacity in the future! I know the clubs in great hands now. Can't wait to see some more success come its way. Thanks for being a part of my journey! Go Bombers!!

## <u>Dan Eddy – collating EFC's oral history</u>

In 2022, as part of Essendon's 150-year celebrations, club historian and author Dr Dan Eddy conducted several podcast interviews with past players and officials, including Ken Fraser, Simon Madden, Greg Sewell, Paul Salmon and Gavin Wanganeen. This year, with the support of the EFCPP&OA and the Essendonians, Dan is endeavouring to interview significantly more past players, coaches and officials from our great club, to produce one of the largest oral history collections of any AFL club. As he says, "Ideally, I want to interview *every* living past player, plus children of deceased players and coaches, so we then have everyone's story on tape for current and future generations to learn and benefit from."



A selection of 15 podcasts will be aired via Essendon FC's media channels, but the majority will be released through Dan's and our EFCPP&OA Website and social media platforms. He is intending to record both audio and video where possible, in what promises to be an exciting project that recognises the contribution of figures from all previous generations. Some long-time supporters will also be interviewed.

Whether you played one game or 400, expect a call from Dan at some stage in the weeks and months ahead. Most interviews will be conducted in the subject's home, using Dan's own equipment, and then supplied to our Association to be used as we deem fit. He is also keen to see scrapbooks, photographs and memorabilia that members of our Association have in their private possession.

## The Many Lives of Brian Sampson

Recently over a coffee with Premiership Captain Ken Fraser, Ken showed me his copy of a book written by teammate Brian Sampson.

The Essendon footy community knew Brian Sampson best through his playing days in the 1960s when he played in the memorable premiership teams of '62 and '65.

Standing at 192cm (6' 4") tall, with great reach Sampson began his career at Essendon in the U19s in 1958. A career-threatening knee injury loomed in this his first season but he overcome the challenge and was promoted to the senior side in 1959. Consistency saw him retain his place in the senior side and he was selected to play in the losing Grand Final team against Melbourne, but injury loomed once again. In *Flying Higher*, author Michael Maplestone notes: "... in the second quarter ... disaster struck when big ruckman, Brian Sampson suffered a shoulder injury and had to be replaced." Returning in 1960 Brian reinjured his knee, finding himself on the sidelines for most of the season. In 1962 Essendon played off for the premiership against Carlton, Brian was the team's, 19th man. The highlight of Brian's career came in 1965. In the Bombers successful premiership campaign, he would be acknowledged as one of Essendon's best players throughout the finals series. Shoulder injury plagued his 1966 season. In 1967 Sampson sought clearance from Essendon to join West Perth in the WAFL.

Lesser known were Brian's other talents and passions. Brian excelled in all that he undertook. After leaving school, he took on a 5-year bricklaying apprenticeship and was awarded the most outstanding apprentice in the State of Victoria for that year.

Down the track, one of his employees, whom Brian mentored, replicated his boss's success by also achieving recognition as Victoria's outstanding apprentice. Several of Brian's apprentices over the years became successful builders and another a teacher at one of the trade colleges. A tribute to his tutelage.

A career highlight was when he was named Employer of the Year by Holmesglen TAFE. Brian enjoyed the ability to earn a good living for his family and give something back to his trade.

Always creative, Brian enjoyed drawing and making models during his school years. He had considered studying architecture after high school but in the end, decided to pursue a trade.

After retiring from professional football, Brian and his wife Margaret visited a garden show. He was fascinated with the display of miniature native figs (bonsai – the Japanese art of miniature trees) and keen to try his hand. Some 15 years on when he had fulfilled his role as coach of his daughters' various sporting teams, worked at perfecting his trade and growing his business, and played golf, it was time for a new interest. The scene was set when Margaret bought him a set of bonsai tools, encouraging him to "Go for it".

Brian found a nurseryman who was an expert in native Australian bonsai, his favourite species, to teach him the horticultural aspects. Later, others taught him the art of Japanese bonsai.

Creating ceramics – pots and figurines followed as did landscape painting - watercolours. In the Sampson garden, Brian amassed a collection of 20,000 bonsai plants. Each taking 10-15 years to mature, he handcrafted ceramic pots, pruning, tending, and nurturing each plant. He also painted watercolours of Australian native bush. Invitations to speak and demonstrate at international conferences and a guest appearance on ABC TV's Gardening Australia followed. (https://www.abc.net.au/gardening/how-to/native-bonsai/9428012).

Brian's book, 'Miniature tree with imagination' was published by his beloved wife Margaret following his death in 2012. His living legacy of beautiful creations remains and are exhibited.

Ken Fraser recalls: Visiting Brian several months before his ill health became very serious, he proudly showed me his wonderful bonsai garden, encompassing nearly all of his backyard.

As we walked, I asked him a question about his football career which had always intrigued me. I said "Brian, through the football seasons you played quite well in the 'Home and Away' matches but in the several final series on the big MCG you played <u>outstandingly</u> and were always in our best players. Why was this so?"

Brian's answer: "That's easy to answer Ken. As a bricklayer I worked physically very hard Monday to Friday, and combined with footy training, by the end of the week I was very tired ... when the finals were on, my boss, a keen Essendon supporter, gave me the Friday off, so I was fighting fit on the Saturday!!"

My comment to Brian was ... "It's a pity your boss didn't give you every Friday off in the footy season Brian, ... you would have won several Brownlow Medals!!" Brian responded with a wry smile!

### Is this our most successful player?

Because of Essendon's long and successful history, many players have enjoyed multiple successes, but none have come close to William "Pos" Watson's record. From his first win in 1885 he seems to have played in at least 17 premierships in just 20 seasons!

His first taste of success was as a 14-year-old playing with South Warrnambool juniors in 1885. He graduated to Warrnambool seniors the following year and they were premiers every year from 1886 to 1894.

He joined Essendon in 1891 and played 69 games, including the 1891-1894 premierships. He then left for Western Australia to captain the very successful South Fremantle club in 1895 and played in the 1896 and 1898 flags.

That only adds up to 13 wins. His total jumps to 17 because from 1891 to 1894, he played for Warrnambool mid-week and travelled to Melbourne by train to play with Essendon on Saturday. As

69 Games -Essendon Football Club 1891-1894

Essendon won four successive flags, from 1891 to 1894, that gave him the extraordinary record of eight premierships in four years!

Watson was described by Grif John (the founder of South Fremantle) as second only to Albert Thurgood as the greatest player Western Australia had seen. It is unlikely that his winning record will be surpassed.
