The 1923 premiership

Essendon's 5th premiership in 1923 was built on the famous "Mosquito Fleet", a group of little men whose innovative combination of speed and elusiveness changed football.

Six players were 5'6" (170cm) or less; Charlie Hardy is one of the shortest players in VFL/AFL history and "Tich" Shorten's 51kg makes him the lightest player. Essendon's lightest current player is Will Snelling at 70kg.

There were stars all over the ground. The speedy small men were supported by dashing defenders such as Hall of Fame Legend, Tom Fitzmaurice, and the flamboyant Roy Laing. Full-forward Greg Stockdale set a new League goalkicking record that year. Ruckman Norm Beckton was one of the best big men of his time. They were led by captain, Syd Barker, who had been a star with North Melbourne.



A surprise selection was 33-year-old George Rawle, the League's fourth oldest player on debut and only the third player to debut in a Grand Final.

Essendon's opponent was reigning premiers, Fitzroy, and most expected their bigger and stronger team to beat the lighter, quicker Same Olds, but the new look Essendon prevailed, winning 8.15.63 to 6.10.46.

Reflections of a life-time connection with EFC

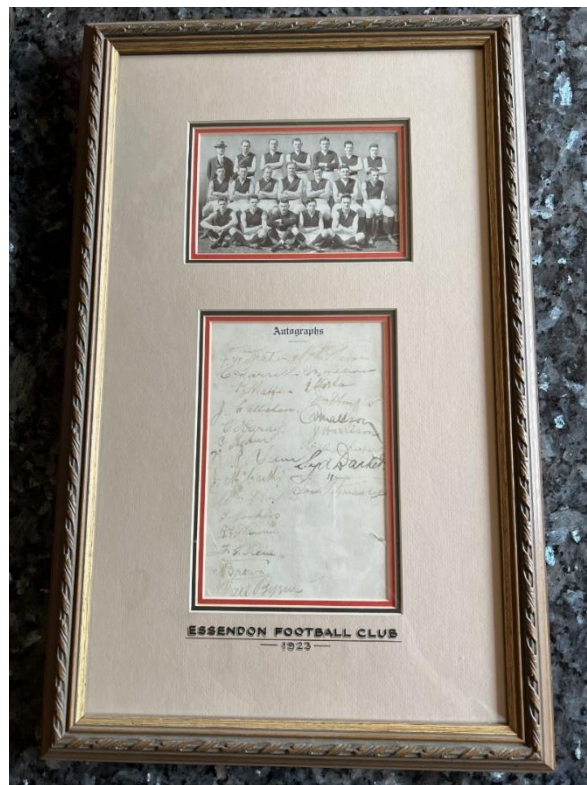
What a great night the 150th celebration for Essendon Football Club was!! It was certainly a time for reflection for me on my lifetime of association with Essendon Football. In fact, my connection to Essendon FC started about 8 months before I was born as my mother attended the winning 1950 Grand Final being in the early stages of pregnancy with me!!

My father used to speak of a young fellow called Jack Jones who lived across the road from them as children in Roseberry St, Ascot Vale. He spoke so highly of Jack, but I only came to know him in the first 11 years after I returned to work at the football club. My father told me that he was a wonderful person and later a wonderful footballer at EFC. As we all know, sadly, Jack died last year with Covid limiting the amount of acknowledgement and numbers of people who could attend his funeral. Undoubtedly the funeral would have been huge if not restricted by Covid.

From a young age, I was lucky enough to go to the football with my aunt who had a spare seat in the Essendon "Club" stand at Windy Hill which is where the Windy Hill Fitness Centre is now. When I was a little older, I used to stand on the wing with mum and dad who were both passionate Essendon supporters. Dad was a carpenter, and he made a fold up stool so that I could stand at about an adult height to be able to see the football!! Later, mum and dad bought tickets for seats in the Reynolds stand which is the main remaining stand at the ground now. When they got older and stopped going to the football, I took over these tickets and attended there with my family.



I was also lucky fortunate when, about 40 years ago, my great uncle gave me the card that he had kept to the "Smoke Social" for Essendon Football Club celebrating the 1923 VFL premiership. The card itself was starting to deteriorate a little so I had it framed so that the front and the back of the card could be displayed, and the cardboard protected from further deterioration. It has a photo of the team, and all players signed the card individually. It is amazing to think that next year will be 100 years since that "Smoke Social". Life has moved on a lot since those times, and one cannot imagine now having a "smoke social".



My other association with Essendon Football Club was through my uncle from a young age, in fact, when I was only one year of age, he was the vice-captain of the Essendon under 19 side of which Greg Sewell was a member. Greg remained a good friend of my uncle throughout his life

and still maintains some indirect association with the family. My aunt had kept an Essendon FC Blazer from the 1952 under-19s team, and I showed Greg the photograph of it and brought back a lot of memories for him as well.

I am currently in my 13th year as one of the club doctors at Essendon and was previously there in the early 90s for about four years in a lesser medical role at that time. In my role over those 2 periods, I have been privileged to work with Dr Bruce Reid for probably 16 of those years – a legend of the football club. With the retirement of Dr Ian Reynolds (who I took over from at the club and worked with in the early 1990s at EFC) and Bruce's death, I see even more of the Essendon's retired players as patients, which I regard as a real honour and connection with the past, having seen many of these players on the field in their playing days.

I feel very privileged to be an Essendon Club Doctor and be associated with the club of which I've been a lifelong supporter. Even more privileged did I feel when I was given life membership in December 2021.

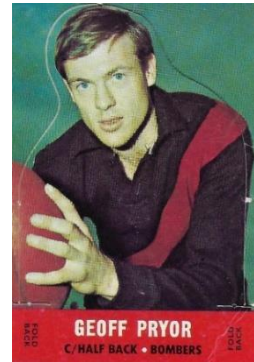
Geoff Pryor

What did you do, football wise, following your playing days with Essendon?

After I stopped playing, I had a job overseas.

What job/jobs did you pursue following your playing days, including what you are doing currently?

- Represented Australia within the then Trade Commissioner service.
- Employed as a political organizer and Ministerial adviser.
- Set up and operated my own consultancy firm.
- Managed for a non-profit company, NSW Government programs within the SE of NSW covering sustainable business development with a focus on waste stream management.

Are you still working?

Formally no, but I lead an active life across different community sectors.

Have you suffered with any post football injuries and have any required surgery?

I have a pace maker now, as a result of suffering from an atrial fibrillation, which my specialist at the time, claimed was a result of the stress from the physical demands of football, but this link is probably very hard to prove. Otherwise I'm very fortunate to be generally in good health.

Do you have any ongoing medical problems?

No – just getting older.

What are your thoughts on the modern game, and how would you change any of the areas that you don't like!

I am impressed by the skills and physical fitness of players, but find watching the game, when that is possible in an impoverished Canberra free-to-air TV coverage situation, probably not so engaging.

Whilst recognizing the strength and speed of players today and the potential damage that collisions can have on players short- and long-term health, (both for men and women), a core ingredient of a 'gladiator' sport such as Aussie rules is body contact, and this is slipping away, along with contested marking in general play.

Changing these circumstances requires some deep thinking about the nature of sport in society and how key stakeholders might respond to these issues and pressures.

Do you have any special anecdotes from your playing time to pass onto other past players?

In my last year at Essendon, towards the very last game of the season, Jim Bradley (fitness coach) was brought out to a training session and he had a video camera and filmed players kicking styles. I was included in this.

It was the first time I had properly seen my fluid and elegant kicking style. As I watch these days the full backs kick 100 miles and go direct to players positions, I pity the strategic weakness of this attribute. The opposition can expect such a play, unless someone has sneaked off to a hidden part of the ground. Practice dealing with a wobbly floating punt, off-line from the way the body is positioned, and thus the ball goes to the unexpected part of the ground, was a decided team advantage, and I still await credit for this clever ploy, and as well as the help it provided to general fitness.



Who were your mates in your playing days with Essendon, do you keep in touch?

Over time, one tends to be closest to those playing in the team of one's first year and, as we all know, those picked to play in defensive positions are naturally close knit and supportive of each other. However, over a longer-term, older players finished their playing days and new players came along and new friendships developed. I was really fortunate in experiencing such a playing group transition at Essendon, and thus enjoyed the company of many great people.

Who were the players you most admired in your playing days at Essendon?

For Essendon: In a successful club like Essendon at the time I played, it's not hard to admire so many, but, at the risk of being selective and thus overlooking so many really great players and people, for a range of different but position-related reasons, players such as Barry Davis, Darryl Gerlach, Don McKenzie, Jack Clark, Allan Noonan, Laurie Maloney, Michael Moss represent a spectrum of the skills of players I admired in the club.

Other teams:

Jesaulenko, Hudson, Nichols, again reflecting those against whom one came up against in games.

Do you have any comments that you would like to pass on about your time at Essendon?

I found the players, coaches and staff at Essendon by and large, were a great bunch of interesting, vital and dedicated people. The more public clashes reported at times in the media between club administrators and players overshadowed what was otherwise a successful and cohesive club. I think a special attribute of the club was the number of past players of my era who went on to play active leadership roles within its administration.

My present football interest includes concern for the undue commercialisation of Aussie Rules Football. Aussie Rules is unique as a game, being a home grown sport and which should be enjoyed at all levels and locations across the country. The AFL Commission, I believe, presently has too great a focus upon profit at the expense of the idea of sport and well-being in the wider community. The looming health issues associated with brain damage to players through collisions perhaps should be addressed within this, (what I consider to be), an inappropriate commercial focus. Past Players might begin or continue a broader conversation about this matter.

We were saddened to hear of the passing of EFCPP&OA members:

Vale John “Killer” Kilby

“The players call me 'Killer'. I don't like the name, but they gave it to me in 1968”

John’s contribution to EFC was vast, joining the club in 1965 as U19’s Head Trainer, then progressed to Reserves Head Trainer in 1979-1983 and Seniors Head trainer in 1984-1996.

John then remained employed by the club as the team’s Medical Assistant, until his retirement in 2018 at the age of 82.

An EFC & EFCPP&OA Life Member, Killer served the club with distinction and was a much loved and respected figure around the club.

Below is a summary of Killer’s outstanding service to our Club:

- Commenced with the EFC in the middle of 1965, with full appointment at the start of 1966 with the Under 19’s.
- Approximately 13 years as Head Trainer with the Under 19’s, until 1979 at \$3 per week salary
- Appointed as Head Trainer of the Reserves in 1979.
- Appointed as Head Trainer of the Seniors in 1984.
- Was a state representative in 1985, 1990 and 1996.
- The Seniors won Premierships in 1984, 1985, 1993 whilst he was Head Trainer, and 2000 as Medical Assistant.
- Was replaced in 1996 as Head Trainer but remained employed as Medical Assistant.
- Attended every skills training session since that time, 3 times per week, even in his 80’s.
- He still attended every Melbourne based home game during the 2018 season taping players ankles.

As sign of respect and testament to John, over 130 people attended his funeral including Essendon Football Club Players and Officials from the past 8 decades and 13 Captains. The church service was followed by a wake function, appropriately held at Windy Hill Venue, where 100 people attended, reminiscing and sharing stories about Killer. It was a wonderful celebration of a man that dedicated his life to the Essendon Football Club and lived the life he wanted.

A talented footballer, Barry won the U19s best and fairest in 1952 and then played 7 games for Essendon between 1954-1955. Barry passed away on 19th May 2023.
