The catch ups provide a great insight into various aspects of the inner sanctum of the Club as well as the opportunity for members to meet regularly in an informal casual setting.



All players who have played one or more senior match for the Club are post-career presented with an EFC Recognition jumper to identify their debut number, years played, games played and playing number/s.

Dylan Clarke and Devon Smith were presented their EFC Recognition jumper at the Club's Chairman's Function at Essendon's Round 14 match v Geelong at MCG on Saturday 14 June.

James Demetriou awarded Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM)

The Association also congratulates past player James Demetriou on being awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia in the King's Birthday Honours. James has been honoured for his service to sport, to education, and to business.

James played 9 games for EFC (1975-1976) and later served on the Clubs's Board in the mid-to-late 1990s.

James was also the founding chair of the Australian Sports Technologies Network (ASTN) and also Sports Without Borders. He was also a City of Coburg Councillor in the early to mid '80s and has held leadership positions in university programs at Swinburne, Monash, and Melbourne University.

One of Essendon's Great Legend's- Jack Clarke

Jack Clarke was one of Essendon's greatest players. He was a great centreman and then rover who joined Essendon from Essendon High school at the age of 14 in 1947. He was Vice-Captain of the U19's at the age of 15 and was runner-up in the Morrish Medal, the Best and Fairest in the competition in 1950. He won the U19 Best and Fairest awards in 1949 and 1950.

Jack was a sporting natural and a very smart football thinker, fearless in his approach to the ball, which unfortunately caused him many severe head knocks and other injuries.

He was Captain of Essendon from 1958 till 1964. He won the club's Best & Fairest awards in 1958 and 1962 and was runner up an incredible 6 times, 1953, 1955, 1957, 1959, 1960 and 1963. Jack led the side to the 1962 Premiership and was also an outstanding player in the 1965 flag.

During his playing career Jack polled 116 Brownlow Medal votes and played 263 games, kicking 180 goals.

Jack represented the State in all years from 1953 to 1962 and won All Australian blazers in 1953, 1956 and 1958. He Captained the State team 1959, 1960 and 1962, playing 27 State games during his career.

Jack was appointed as Coach of the EFC in 1968 to 1970, leading the club to Runners-up in 1968, losing to Carlton by 3 points.

Jack was an Architect and developed the W.H Cookson Stand at Windy Hill, which opened in 1963.

Jack's family was certainly a great sporting family, his father Tom playing for the EFC in the 1930's and later as a Committeeman for many years and his brother, Ron, playing games with the Reserves at Essendon in the 1950's and then becoming a world champion athlete in long distance running, as well as carrying the torch to light up the flame for the 1956 Olympic Games in Melbourne.



Jack was named in the centre in Essendon's team of the century and at number 8 in the Champions of Essendon in 2002. He was inducted as a Legend of the club in 1996 and an inaugural member of the Australian Football Hall of Fame in the same year. He was also awarded Life Membership of the AFL in 1999.

Jack Clarke was an outstanding footballer for Essendon and following his football career went on to be a great veteran athlete. He would have fitted in well with the football today due to his great skills at all levels.

Jack passed away in 2001 from cancer, which was a huge shock to all who knew him, as he maintained a great fitness level all of his life.

Essendon's first family: the McCrackens



Essendon is very much a "McCracken" club: it was formed at Robert McCracken's home "Ailsa" in 1872, he was the first president, his son, John, kicked Essendon's first goal in the Club's first official game in 1873, and the team was captained by John's cousin. Coiler McCracken.

But the greatest contribution was made by Robert's younger son, Alex. A summary of his achievements demonstrates this:

- Player, 1878 -1880
- Secretary, 1872 1887
- Essendon's delegate to the newly-formed VFA
- President, 1887 1903
- Patron, 1903 1908
- Essendon's first life member
- Inaugural member of Essendon's Hall of Fame, later Legend
- Inaugural VFL President, 1897- 915
- VFL/AFL life member, 1905
- founder and/or president of many local sporting clubs

Alex married Mary Peck, daughter of John Murray Peck who was co-founder of Cobb & Co. and a foundation member and vice-president of the Football Club.




The McCracken and Peck families have left their mark on Essendon and Strathmore:

- Essendon High School and Essendon's first golf club (now Riverside) were built on McCracken land
- four of their homes still exist: Alex's "North Park" (now owned by St Columban's Mission Society); Coiler's, "Earlsbrae" (now Lowther Hall); Robert's, "Ailsa" (now owned by the Church of Scientology); John Murray Peck's, "Lebanon" (the oldest house in Strathmore)
- •local streets: Ardmillan Rd, McCracken St, Hedderick St, Ailsa St, Mascoma St and Peck St

Tradition says Essendon's iconic red and black colours come from the McCracken coat-of-arms, but that has not been verified.

Alex's enormous contribution is honoured by the Football Club in the McCracken Medal which is voted for by the players and awarded to the player who best represents Essendon's values.

Obituary

Vale Stuart Barclay 1949-2025

Stuart played in Essendon's 1968 Reserves premiership side then made his senior debut in 1969 and played 39 senior games for Essendon between 1969-1973.

Stuart was a rangy right footer who began in the back pocket then played on the half back line. In the back pocket he often picked up the resting opposition ruckman. Although lightly built he was quick, had a good spring and was a good mark.

Post-Essendon, Stuart played and coached in Tasmania and Queensland including representing Tasmania in state football from 1974-1977 and Queensland in 1978 & 1980.

Vale Fred Payne 1927-2025

Fred lived a great life and passed away at the age of 98.

A courageous follower and half-forward from Ardmona, Fred played 42 matches for EFC between 1949-1953. Payne featured in a winning 1950 reserves Grand Final after playing 10 senior games throughout the season.



Post Essendon, he played for Hawthorn Seconds, Kyneton, returned to play for the Essendon Seconds, then Sunbury, and Murchison, before finishing his career back at Ardmona.

Significant highlights from the 1965 Premiership

- The win was especially significant as it represented only the third time in VFL history that a team had won the flag after finishing fourth on the home and away ladder.
- The Bombers went into that Grand Final as the underdog with its opponent, St. Kilda, the tipsters' favourite due to being on top at the end of the home and away season. The Saints were also the sentimental favourites as they were pursuing their first VFL premiership.
- Another significant news story from the Grand Final was the goal scoring performance of Essendon star forward Ted Fordham who booted a then VFL Grand Final equalling record 7 goals.
- The undersized Saint's ruckman Alan Morrow sustained a match-ending ankle injury by quarter time. His departure from the game was significant as it left the young blond 'bombshell' Carl Ditterich to compete against Don McKenzie and Brian Sampson. This was too big a task in the end.
- The power and 'fire' of Essendon's strong men of the time in Ian 'Bluey' Shelton and Alec 'Kookaburra' Epis could not be underestimated on the 'big day' despite both players returning to the senior side after several weeks sidelined with injury. Shelton, as well as shoulder injury, had also lost sight in an eye due to a farm accident during that year. However, he was so important to the confidence of the team and Coach John Coleman loved his toughness.
- The loss of Half Forward John Somerville due to the much-publicised Duncan Wright incident from the preceding Preliminary Final could have 'steeled' the Bombers into an unlosable state of mind.




